SENIORS~ Applications for admission to post-secondary schools should be completed this month. After your applications have been submitted <u>it is crucial that families file the FASFA form online to</u> <u>qualify for financial aid</u>. For more information and assistance with your FASFA form please contact the guidance department at 763-5616. Senior students should begin checking their emails and the guidance website for updated scholarship information.

PORTALS – Colleges typically communicate with students through portals set up by the students, prompted by the schools, upon applying. These communications can include important admissions information as well as financial aid tips and deadlines.

JUNIORS~ After the holiday break Juniors will meet individually with their guidance counselor to start planning for life after high school. In the Junior year of high school, students begin to seriously investigate options and opportunities for their career and/or college placement. Outside of the individual meetings and potential job shadow opportunities, students can take advantage of the web based career pathways program – XELLO (accessed through student power school accounts). Mr. Cooney will be in the Economics/Civics class before and after the holiday break, using XELLO, to discuss career planning and to help facilitate a career and budget project. This will be the lead into the individual meetings.

PSAT~ Students who took the PSAT this fall should have received an email this week from College Board directing them to access their scores on-line. Typically, college board releases an access code and the students are prompted to set up their accounts. These accounts should facilitate a relationship with College Board that promotes college searches, SAT prep (via KHAN ACADEMY online) and easy online registration for the SAT as well as score sends.

- Lunch will be provided for high school students at 11:48 each day. Only students who have a make-up exam should be on school property after lunch.
